The food was served buffet style and just kept coming out all night. The variety kept your taste buds on edge. From the mini-lamb chops to the carving station to the pasta and salad bars. What to eat next? Oh that's right, dessert! John the "Party On DJ" kept the music going and the dance floor was hopping all night. The conversations were lively and it was great to see old friends and meet new ones. Linda and her team did another outstanding job to bring us a wonderful night. Thank you to all.

I would also like to thank the Board for their continued support and the workers who make all of the events possible throughout the year. You all deserve a round of applause. Well done! We look forward to seeing you again next year.

That wraps up another year for the NNJR. Despite the economy and the gloom and doom, we made it through another year. We are in good shape as a club. The season was up and down but in the end it all turned out well. Racing did well, solo had a great year and rally continues to soldier on. We have a strong schedule of events coming up in 2011 starting with the Region Party. This year the Region Party will be held once again at the Packanack Lake Club House on Sunday, January 30<sup>th</sup> from 2:00 - 6:00PM. There will be catered food, beer, wine and trophy presentations. We guarantee a good time will be had by all. So come on out and enjoy, you've earned it.

There are several events in March in 2011 starting with the Roundtable to be held somewhere in the Pocono region of PA. There will be a driver's school at the NJMP Lightning course put on by the JRB. For those of you who missed not going to Pocono last year, you're in luck as the Pocono Mother's Day weekend is back on the schedule for 2011. We will also have events at both the Thunderbolt and Lightning courses later in the season. Check out the full schedule at <a href="www.scca-nnjr.org">www.scca-nnjr.org</a> and start making plans.

So, what to do till then? Well if it's too cold to work on the racecar or you're just not ready to start yet, why not get some seat time doing some arm chair racing? There are lots of options available for the PC and gaming systems like PS3, or the Sony Play station. I prefer the PC so here are my favorites:

My personal favorite was made for the PC and released back in 2004. It's called GTL or GT-Legends (still available on line). It is styled after the European Historic GT series, the same one that has been shown on the Versus HD channel. It features cars from the 60's and 70's like the Mini, the Jaguar XKs or 65 Corvette and early Cobras including the Daytona coupe. From the 70's it includes the Porsche RSR, Pantera or the BMW CSL. The base game comes with twelve well detailed European circuits, Spa, Monza and Magny Cours to name just a few. The graphics are amazing and the cars are well detailed. The race weekend includes open practice, qualifying and a feature race. You can race in individual races against AI cars (up to 34 opponents) or you can race on-line against other SIM racers. There is also a career mode which allows you to work your way up from the smallest class (Mini) to the fastest cars (Porsche RSR). You can also pick your skill level from amateur to professional. There are other cars and tracks available as add ons. These are made by a dedicated group of SIM racers known as modders. I have all of the northeast tracks, Watkins Glen, Lime Rock, Summit Point and New Hampshire. There's also a version of the Pocono track (when we ran counter clockwise). Thunderbolt has been modeled and a beta version is currently available. My favorite add on cars are the 1961 Ferrari 250 GT SWB, the Aston Martin BD4 and from the 70's, the Porsche 935.

Rfactor, available for PC on line in the US. Cost is about \$35. The car and race series list for rfactor are almost unlimited. They have almost every Grand Prix season from 1966 through 2010 available for download (all free). Sports cars from the 1960's to the most recent ALMS Series cars. Again, all available for free. There is a full support community on line that continues to create and release new mods for rafetor. The game is difficult with a fairly steep learning curve but is very engaging. Car setups are important and you can change or adjust everything on the cars from castor, camber, springs, shock settings to weight distribution. The cars are very responsive to each input. You can race against the AI or on line against people from all around the world. Be careful, this game will suck you in and you will loose all track of time.

There is a modern version of GTL available also, GTR2. It is virtually the same as GTL but with the modern GT classes, with cars like the Ferrari 430, Aston Martin and Corvettes. Modders have made all of the ALMS prototypes like the Audi R8, R10 and R15, the Peugeot 908 the Porsche RS and Acura available for the game. Some of the greatest race cars of today! You can also add the Le Mans 24 track and Sebring! GTR2 simulates not just the cars and races but the passage of time also. You can actually run the full 24 hours of Le Mans against the actual field of cars that ran there! It is amazing at Le Mans when the sun goes down and it gets dark. Turn on the headlights and run through the night. The game simulates full pit stops for fuel and tires or car repairs. Be careful not to run too hot as the game also models damage and things like engine or brake failures. You want to make your car last until the end!

GPL or Grand Prix Legends. One of the oldest of the PC games from 1999. The original game came with the 1967, 3 litre Formula One cars and the 10 circuits used during the 1967 season. Monaco, Silverstone, Monza, Zandvordt and the Nurburgring. What made this one outstanding was the physics engine. It is still considered the benchmark for today's PC games. The original graphics are dated and it can only run at 36 frames per second, but is still the most challenging game out there. Modders have created almost every track from around the world for this game. They have also created the 1966, 1968 and 1969 (high wing and low wing) seasons cars. Recently they released the 60's sports cars addition for this game and the mother of all tracks, the Targa Florio(all 43 miles of it). You can drive the Ferrari P4, Chapparal 2G, Ford GT40 or Porsche 908 through the streets of Sicily.

To fully enjoy any of the above games, I suggest you purchase a good wheel and pedal set. There are several moderately priced units made by Logitech that are very good. To get the most out of the games buy a good video card and a good LCD monitor (the bigger the better). Have fun and don't forget to take a break once in a while!





The tractor portion of this eighteen wheeler is painted up as the head of a swooping bald eagle and this design continues back into the trailer portion. Since this is the point where the rig articulates, when the truck turns left or right, it's as though the eagle is keeping an eye on things and perhaps searching for prey. (Like maybe some terrorist hijackers, ya think?) The names of the Flight 93 crew and passengers are inscribed around the bottom of the semitrailer.

Speaking of the **Flight 93 Memorial**, again this year forty wreaths were placed at the Temporary Memorial on the second Saturday in December. This program is but a small part of a nationwide – and even world-wide — program called **Wreaths Across America**. **It's** the brainchild of **Morrill Worcester** of the Worcester Wreath Company in Maine. This year well over 100 thousand wreaths were placed at the graves of United States service personnel and veterans at over 350 cemeteries around the world. In 2006 Wreaths Across America extended the program to include the Pentagon, the WTC and the Flight 93 Memorial. And it was kind of appropriate that the second Saturday this year fell on the  $11^{th}$  – exactly nine years and three months....

As I was preparing my column for the last issue, we were coming into the weekend of the last regional races on the NE-Div calendar for 2010. The "Jersey Road Racing Classic" was going to be contested that weekend at New Jersey Motorsports Park. This is the race which is occasionally referred to by its acronym, JRRC, and expressed as the "Jerk". In 2009 the weather was nothing short of atrocious for The Jerk and I was hoping that the weather gods wouldn't do it to us two years in a row. Well it turned out that the weather for the weekend was glorious. Almost unseasonably warm temperatures under a sunny sky were a wonderful change from the weather the year before. Everyone had a good time and competitors got three races for their entry fee over the course of the weekend.

Those who participated in the NNJR/SJR "Jerk" event back in October may recall that there was a "Coats For Kids" drive that weekend and folks could elect to make a contribution toward the purchase of warm winter clothing which would then bring some warmth and holiday happiness to children of need in Cumberland County where NJMP is located. On December 10<sup>th</sup> more than five hundred needy kids were invited to the track where they met with Santa and were given a hot lunch, a new winter coat, hats, gloves, scarf and other holiday gifts. Subaru of America and WalMart as well as our own South Jersey Region of the SCCA participated in the program to pull this off. SJR also conducted an AutoCross event which benefitted the Coats For Kids program.

Rearview cameras could become standard equipment for all cars and trucks by 2014, if a new proposal by the federal Department of Transportation makes its way into law. Seems that the DOT may require that all vehicles enable the driver with a full view of the car's surroundings to the rear when the car is in reverse. Given the obstructions built into today's vehicles, the rule would essentially require standard rearview cameras like those embedded in rearview mirrors or those that display inside a navigation-system screen.

The National Highway Traffic Safety Administration says that nearly 300 people die each year as a result of backup accidents. NHTSA also attributes 18,000 injuries to the scenario, pointing out that children and elderly pedestrians are in the highest-risk group for backup accidents.

In compliance with our bylaws, NNJR held its one required meeting of the year on November 16 at **II Villagio** in Morris Plains. Secretary **Bob Zecca** was unable to attend the meeting due to his having had a coronary hic-cup the weekend before. However the single most important item of official business to be tended to was easily accomplished after some fast adjustments to the status of a certain member in attendance. While keeping one eye on a copy of our club's bylaws, the **Board of Trustees** did some fancy tapdancing and **Butch O'Connor** was given a brevet field commission appointing him as acting Secretary so that he could cast the one necessary vote to elect the slate of officers & trustees for the 2011 year. Besides the scheduling meeting which always takes place at the Mini-Con, the division also gives out a bunch of awards recognizing service in the racing area. Our own Chief of the Grid, **Diane O'Connor** was recognized as the **NE-Div Worker of the Year** and gets to wear the coveted Red Jacket for the next twelve months. And Chief of the Start, **Peter Watson** was presented with the **Arch James Memorial Starter Trophy**. In each case, the presentation certainly recognized many, many years of volunteer service to the region, the division and the club. Well deserved and congrats to both Diane & Peter!

A couple days prior to the Region's Annual Meeting Secretary **Bob Zecca** was admitted to the hospital for what I called a hic-cup with his heart. Eventually it was realized that Bob needed a Roto-Rooter job on some of the plumbing around his heart. The docs also decided to install a couple of stents in the piping around his ticker. 


GH: Okay? I guess...






